Organ Donation New Zealand (ODNZ) is the national service for deceased organ and tissue donation. It is managed through the Auckland District Health Board and the offices are situated at the Greenlane Clinical Centre in Auckland.

ODNZ co-ordinates organ and tissue donation from deceased donors in New Zealand and the donor co-ordinators provide information and ongoing support for those families who have generously donated organs or tissues.

ODNZ continues to audit donation practises in New Zealand and works with health professionals in donor hospitals

to ensure there are nationally consistent processes for deceased donation.

The service provides education for health professionals, supplies information to the media and responds to public enquiries.

ODNZ was grateful to receive additional funding from the Ministry of Health.

## Staffing

Janice Langlands (team leader) and Mary O'Donnell are the donor co-ordinators for ODNZ. The recruitment of two new donor co-ordinators commenced in late 2012. The two medical specialists: Dr Stephen Streat (clinical director) and Dr James Judson have continued in their roles, as have Melanie Stevenson (nee Selby) as the communications advisor and Margaret Kent as the team administrator.

#### **Link Teams:**

The Link Teams play a key role as local leaders, experts and liaison persons for organ and tissue donation in all donor hospitals in New Zealand. They consist of Intensive Care Unit (ICU) Link Nurse(s), Operating Theatre Link Nurse(s) and an ICU Link Doctor.

#### **Advisory Committee**

The Advisory Committee comprises representatives from intensive care medicine and nursing, organ and tissue transplantation, representatives of

Maori health and Pacific health, and a consumer representative. The committee remained unchanged in 2012 and met with ODNZ in December.

## Co-ordination of Organ and Tissue Donation

The donor co-ordinators provide a 24-hour service for referrals from ICUs for organ donation, for tissue donation and for referrals of livers and cardiothoracic organs from Australia.

A medical specialist is available to provide advice and support for health professionals in the ICUs on all aspects of the donation process.

# Donor Family Support

The donor co-ordinators provide information and support for donor families both before and after organ and tissue donation. This can include:

- information about the donation process
- providing hand prints and locks of hair of their family member
- general information about the outcome of the donation
- anonymous communication from the recipients
- · Thanksgiving Services.

The Thanksgiving Services respectfully acknowledge the generosity of families who have donated organs and tissues

following the death of a family member. Families of donors, recipients and their families, and health professionals involved in both organ donation and transplantation are invited to these services.

A Service was held at the Holy Trinity Cathedral, Parnell, Auckland in 2012 with approximately 500 attendees. A Service was also held at Christ's College Cathedral in Christchurch and approximately 250 people attended this. The Christchurch Service was especially poignant as in the past the Services were held at the Cathedral.

#### **Education**

## Study Days and Health Professional Education

In 2012 study days were held in the hospitals identified on the right. These study days include all aspects of the donation process and are attended by nursing staff from ICUs and Operating Theatres (OT), and other health professionals involved in donation and transplantation.

Other education sessions were provided for health professionals throughout New Zealand including nursing students and postgraduate nurses.



#### **Education cont...**

#### **Health Professional Education**

Teaching sessions on tissue donation were organised for nursing staff in ICUs and wards at Auckland City Hospital as well as hospices and aged care facilities.

## Australasian Donor Awareness Program Training (ADAPT)

A Medical ADAPT workshop was held in Auckland in September 2012. The facilitators for this workshop were Mr Mal McKissock, bereavement counsellor, Sydney, Dr Stephen Streat and Dr James Judson. This one-day workshop for ICU doctors focused on communication with families.

## **Link Workshop**

The Link Nurses attended a two-day workshop in Auckland in November 2012. The first day of the workshop covered the assessment of potential organ and tissue donors including infectious diseases, social risk factors and skin lesions.

ICU Link Doctors joined ICU Link Nurses on the second day to discuss the data from the ICU Death Audit. The day for OT Nurses focused on renal transplantation which included an overview, surgical aspects, paired kidney exchange and altruistic donation.

#### **ODNZ/ICU Death Audit**

ODNZ is grateful to the ICU Link Nurses who collect and enter data for this Audit. In 2012 Audit meetings were held in May and November (as part of the Link Workshop) and attended by Link Nurses and Link Doctors.

Dr James Judson continued to improve the Audit tool. Online filters were developed to identify data that needed discussion within the ICU team. Newsletters about the ICU Death Audit were distributed to the ICU Link Teams in January and June 2012.

Together with the donor co-ordinators, Dr Judson continued to visit hospitals throughout New Zealand to provide feedback on their own data. Hospitals visited were: Auckland, Middlemore, Waikato, Tauranga, Taranaki, Hutt, Wellington and Wairau. He also presented to the Auckland Paediatric Transplant Group as well as the Auckland and Christchurch Renal Groups.

#### **ODNZ News**

A quarterly newsletter produced by ODNZ and featuring information about organ donation and transplantation continues to be distributed throughout donor hospitals in New Zealand by the Link Nurses. Each newsletter also features a story from a donor family and a transplant recipient and introduces health professionals involved in organ and tissue donation.

#### **Bereavement Course**

In September 2012 bereavement counsellor Mal McKissock facilitated the three-day bereavement course that is organised annually by ODNZ. This was again attended by health professionals who provide support for bereaved families.

#### **Public Awareness**

## Thank You Day 2012

ODNZ, together with Kidney Health New Zealand, held a Thank You Day on World Kidney Day, 8 March 2012. This was an opportunity for recipients to thank their donors and donor families for the life-saving gift they have



received. T-shirts, cards and posters with "Thank You" written on them in different languages were printed and distributed to recipients who wished to be involved. Recipients wearing the brightly coloured t-shirts planted freesia bulbs in their local community to symbolise the new life they have been given. Local media were extremely supportive of the event and different stories featured in 25 newspapers throughout the country, from Kaitaia to Bluff. The freesia bulbs were generously donated by Oderings.

## **School Education Program**

In 2012 ODNZ continued to work with Wellington-based education development company Learning Media to develop an education program about organ donation and transplantation for use in schools throughout the country.

The development of a program for 14-15 year-old students will be released in 2013. The sponsorship provided by the Organ Donation Awareness Trust has been used for this program.

## **Waikato Management School**

Public relations students at the Waikato Management School focused on organ donation for their final assignment. The students set up four 'agencies' to research, plan, design and implement campaigns for ODNZ. The focus of the campaigns was to raise awareness of the need to talk to families about one's wishes regarding organ donation. The campaigns were wide-spread throughout Hamilton and ODNZ was impressed with the innovative ideas the students developed.

## Tissue donation pamphlet

A tissue donation pamphlet was produced to give to patients and/or their families. The pamphlet explains how tissue donation is possible in situations where organ donation is not.



## **Public enquiries**

ODNZ responds to public enquiries from the 24-hour 0800 number (0800 4DONOR) and from the website (www.donor.co.nz).

#### **Organ Donor Awareness Car Show**

ODNZ began working with lung recipient Danny Saunders to organise a classic car show to raise awareness for organ and tissue donation and transplantation. The car show will be held in Tauranga on The Strand, Saturday 16 March 2013 from 9am-3pm.

## Attendance at Conferences and Training Workshops

3rd International Society of Advance Care Planning and End of Life Care Conference 2012, Chicago, 31 May-2 June James Judson attended this conference where there was discussion about tissue donation in Advance Care Plans.

Intensive Bioethics Course 38, Washington, 4-8 June

This is the second time James Judson has attended this annually run course. It provides an excellent basis for understanding the general principles of medical ethics.

Bereavement Course, Auckland, 10-12 September

Mary O'Donnell attended this three-day course run for health professionals who provide support to bereaved families.

Australian and New Zealand Intensive Care Society Annual Scientific Meeting, Adelaide, 25-27 October Stephen Streat was an invited speaker at this meeting and spoke about discussing organ donation with families.

2012 European Organ Donation Congress, 24th ETCO-EDC, Dubrovnik, 5-7 October

James Judson attended this conference which provided an interesting overview of how different countries are approaching issues around acquisition of organs for transplantation.

Public Sector Network-The New Old, Wellington, 2 September

Melanie Stevenson attended this conference which focused on new technologies and social media.

Australian Organ and Tissue Donation and Transplantation Authority: National Electronic Donor Record Workshop, Melbourne, 29 October Australia is developing a web-based electronic referral system for organ and tissue donation. Janice Langlands attended this workshop as New Zealand also wishes to participate in this electronic referral system.

In 2012, 38 deceased donors from ICUs in 13 donor hospitals donated organs (and tissues) for transplantation. This does not include those who donated tissues (eyes, heart valves and skin) only. All donors donated following brain death. There were no donors in 2012 who donated following cardiac death.

In 2012 the first paired kidney exchange between two transplant centres took place at Auckland City and Wellington Hospitals. This involved two simultaneous live donor nephrectomies (one from an altruistic donor) and two simultaneous kidney transplants. The team at ODNZ assisted with the transport of the organs.

In 2012 the New Zealand Heart Transplant Service celebrated 25 years of transplantation. Since the first heart transplant in 1987 at Green Lane Hospital it has performed 253 heart transplants, an average of 10–14 a year. It is now considered the third largest heart transplant unit in Australasia after St Vincents in Sydney and The Alfred in Melbourne.

Hearty Towers, the residence for heart and lung recipients and their families, moved to new, refurbished premises at the old National Women's Hospital site in Auckland.

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The New Zealand Liver Transplant Unit completed its 500th liver transplant in 2012, a milestone completed in less than 15 years since the inception of the programme. To mark the occasion there was a presentation at an Auckland City Hospital Grand Round where Professor Ed Gane pointed out that more than 80% of transplanted patients were still alive more than 10 years after their transplants, a result better than that seen in most centres around the world. Also, in 2012, ten years of paediatric liver transplantation in Auckland was celebrated.

There have now been 40 pancreas transplants since 1998 when pancreas transplantation commenced in New Zealand. Of these transplants, 39 were combined with a kidney transplant.

ODNZ continued to work throughout 2012 to increase the opportunity for tissue donation, particularly in the Auckland region where multi-tissue (heart valve, skin and eye donation) can be facilitated. However, eye donation can be facilitated throughout New Zealand.

In 2012 there were 37 tissue-only donors facilitated by ODNZ. This was a 60% increase from 2011.

Tissue-only donation is also facilitated by:

- The donor tissue co-ordinator from those having coronial autopsies at the Department of Forensic Pathology at Auckland City Hospital
- The corneal co-ordinators from the New Zealand National Eye Bank for eyeonly donors referred directly to their service also including referrals from the Bereavement Team at Middlemore Hospital
- The heart and lung transplant co-ordinators from the explanted hearts from heart transplant recipients.
